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Mandated reporter hotline nyc

Whenever you suspect a child is being abused or neglected, please report your concerns to the New York State Central Register of Child Abuse and Maltreatment (SCR) at 800-342-3720 — open 24 hours a day to answer your call. You can make this call anonymously. Even if you have very little information on which to base your suspicions of abuse or neglect, you should still call the CRS. Trained professionals will determine if the information you have provided can be recorded as a report. If this is the case, the CRS will then alert local child welfare services to initiate an investigation. Mandated journalists often have frequent contact with children and have an early opportunity to help them get the intervention, support and services they need to stay safe and healthy. Some professionals such as doctors, nurses, teachers, police officers and day care workers are mandated by New York State law to report alleged child abuse and neglect to the New York State Central Register (SCR). Go to the full list of mandated journalists Read the Law Back to the Most Important Responsibilities As a mandated journalist, you must immediately report or report (for example, make sure a supervisor makes the report), when, in your professional role, you are presented with reasonable grounds to suspect abuse or neglect. Returning to the higher reasonable cause of reasonable cause to suspect child abuse or neglect means that, based on your observations of the evidence, your professional training and experience, you believe that the parent or legal guardian has injured or put a child at risk of harm. Important Facts Confidentiality The Social Services Act provides for the confidentiality of all sources, including journalists mandated for reports of child abuse and abuse. Penalties for failing to report journalists who fail to report suspicions of abuse or neglect may be charged with a crime. Immunity from liability The Law on child protection states that any person, civil servant or institution participating in good faith in... making a report... under this title, it is subject to immunity from any civil or criminal liability that might otherwise

result from such actions. Malicious and false reports are contrary to the Back to the Top Law The Security Bureau First is a hotline for journalists mandated to help maintain clear and direct lines of communication between the mandated journalist and ACS staff. ACS Office of Safety First Liaisons: Connecting Mandated Journalists to Assigned Child Protection after a report has been made, or when there is an additional need for assistance with a case. Help assess the status of an investigation and address other safety concerns. Work with all interested parties until concerns are resolved. The Office of Safety First cannot accept reports of child abuse and neglect. All reports must be made at the NY State Central Register's mandatory hotline, or call 911 if you believe a child is in immediate danger. These calls are answered by staff at the New York State Office of Children and Family Services in Albany, New York. If the Child Abuse Hotline records a report, it is immediately forwarded electronically to the Monroe County CPS team for investigation and follow-up. State law requires you to complete and submit a special form called LDSS - 2221A Report of Suspected Child Abuse and Maltreatment. It can help you fill out the form first so you know what to expect when you call; but it's optional. (En Espaol) Child abuse is against the law. Victims need an effective child protection service to prevent them from suffering further injuries and disabilities. The purpose of the Child Protective Services Act 1973 is to encourage a more complete reporting of child abuse and neglect. The law established Child Protective Services (CPS) in every county in New York. Each CPS is required to investigate reports of child abuse and neglect, protect children (anyone under the age of 18) from further abuse or neglect, and provide rehabilitation services to affected children, parents and other family members. Concerned. The New York State Office of Child and Family Services maintains the Central Child Abuse and Abuse Registry (SCR), also known as the hotline for reports made pursuant to the Social Services Act. THE SCR receives phone calls alleging child abuse or neglect in New York State. CRS staff provide information on calls to the local CPS for investigation, monitor their rapid response and determine if there are previous reports of child abuse or neglect. The SCR receives 24-hour calls a day from two types of sources: those who are required by law (mandated) to report alleged child abuse and neglect; and calls from unmandated journalists, including from the public. Among those who are mandated journalists: Medical and hospital staff School officials Social Services Officers Social Services Workers Child Care Workers and volunteers Law enforcement personnel Other mandated journalists are listed in the Summary Guide for Mandated Journalists. This publication provides mandated journalists with an overview of their obligations and a conceptual framework for New York State's child protection services system. Child Protection Services/State-wide Central Registry Forms Mandated journalists must file a signed written report on alleged child abuse or neglect (LDSS-2221A) within 48 hours of an oral report. This written report must be filed with the appropriate local CPS. Mandated journalists may request the address of the Investigative District from the SCR Child Protection Specialist at the time of the oral report to the SCR. New York State's Abandoned Infant Protection Act The New York State's Abandoned Infant Protection Act allows a parent to abandon a newborn baby until the age of 30 days anonymously and without fear of prosecution - if the baby is safely abandoned. A parent is not guilty of a crime if the child is left with an appropriate person or in an appropriate place and the parent promptly informs an appropriate person of the infant's location.
